A group of us has given a lot of thought to resuming live meetings at our beloved Kolping. We have weighed the sharing of information and the effects of COVID-19. Restrictions are still in place with social distancing and cleanliness. Our genealogy group is small, but dedicated. We thirst to exchange our information, seek help on our family quests, and learn new information.

How did our forefathers handle the spread of respiratory disease in 1919 in our city? Did any of your relatives perish during the last pandemic? Was "The Grip" recorded on their death certificates? https://www.cincinnatimagazine.com/citywiseblog/the-great-dying-cincinnati-endures-the-1918-influenza-pandemic/. The figures show Cincinnati had 2263 deaths from influenza and pneumonia at that time, with a rate of 5.4 per thousand.

Hamilton County is currently at 188 deaths with 4098 cases. Ohio has recorded 2,735 confirmed or probable COVID-19 deaths. The state had more than 46,127 confirmed or probable cases as of Tuesday, June 23. Ohio's numbers continue to grow.

We have new technology that simply did not exist a century ago. The Web tells us much:

Kolping History Corner

The Singing Clubs of Cincinnati Kolping

Excerpts from "Making a Difference: A History of the Catholic Kolping Society of Cincinnati"

Cincinnati has a long history of German singing societies, with the first one, Der deutsche Gesangverein, being established in 1838. By 1849, a Sängerfest (singing festival) was held in Cincinnati for German singing groups from Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana. At this time, a Nord-Amerikanischer Sängerbund (North American Singers Association) was established, and this organization still exists today. Later on, a local organization was formed called the Combined Singers, which served as an umbrella for all the Cincinnati German singing societies. Numerous Sängerfests have been held in Cincinnati since this early beginning.

With the love of music being so ingrained in the German psyche, it was only natural that members of the newly formed Cincinnati Kolping Society wanted to start their own singing group. Immediately, many of the founding members formed a Kolping Choir under the leadership of one of the members, Anton Estenfelder. They even sang at the first founding day celebration on November 26, 1924. By 1928, the Choir was being led by Professor Frank Mahler, who was well-known in Cincinnati. Professor Mahler led the Choir until 1960.

The Kolping Choir sang at many Kolping events, but they also sang at many public events as well, including a concert in the Great Hall in the Alms Hotel, a spring concert with the Combined Singers at the Cincinnati Zoo, and concerts at many other festivals. It also participated in the Sängerfests of the Southern Ohio and Kentucky singer region (Sängerbezirks) of the North American Singers Association (Sängerbund).

The Kolping Choir started holding its own Sängerfests in 1938, and in 1939 when Cincinnati Kolping leased the new "Kolping Grove" at the Muehlenhardt Farm on Winton Road, these singing festivals were held there. For a while, the choir held weekly singfests on a smaller scale, and also participated in the United Singers' Concert held in Music Hall each year. In the 1940s and 1950s the choir members held Sängerballs once a year and of course continued singing at the Kolping Communion Sundays. Of all the subgroups of Cincinnati Kolping, the Singing Club seemed to always be one of the true pillars of the Society, as well as one of its most popular subgroups. In 1949, the choir had thirty members, still all male at that point in time, and Frank Mahler was still its director.

In the 1950s, membership in the Kolping Choir began to wane, and by the early 1960s, the men-only choir decided to recruit women to supplement its numbers. They continued to sing at all the church-related festivities of the Kolping Society, and also sang at the 1963 National Convention which took place here in Cincinnati. Unfortunately, the Singing Club decided to disband in the mid-1960s. So, the voices of the Singing Club, which had been a stalwart and a rallying point for the Cincinnati Kolping Society from its very beginnings, sadly became silent. A part of the Kolping heart was missing; however, there was a glimmer of hope, and after a drought of twenty-five years, the beautiful sounds of a German choir would be heard again in the halls of Kolping in 1989.

Against the background of history, in June of 1989, the Kolping Sängerchor was founded by Carolann and Jim Slouffman and a group of twenty dedicated singers from the Catholic Kolping Society of Cincinnati. They united in a common bond for their love of German music while preserving the heritage of the singing societies in the Cincinnati area.

Some of the early performances of this group, singing in two-part harmony, included appearances at the Bakers' Ball, the Polkafest, the lighting of the City of Cincinnati's Christmas tree at Fountain Square and a gala for our sister city of Munich. In 1990, the Kolping Sängerchor joined the Nord-Amerikanischer Sängerbund, just as the Kolping Choir before them had. The Sängerchor performed at their first National Sängerfest in May 1992 in Omaha, Nebraska, and since then, they have performed at every National and District Sängerfest since.

The Chor has sung with the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra at Music Hall, Riverbend Music Center, and various city parks from 1995 – 2008. They have gone on three concert tours in Germany, have sung at Great American Ball Park, the Downtown Oktoberfest, German Day, Kolping Schützenfest, Donauschwaben Oktoberfest, the Ohio State Fair, Tall

Stacks, the Hofbräuhaus, and many other venues throughout the city of Cincinnati. They also participated in the World Choir Games in Cincinnati in 2012, earning a bronze diploma in the folklore category.

In April of this year, the Kolping Sängerchor was anticipating hosting the 65th Bezirks Sängerfest of the SOKII District of the NASB, but due to the Coronavirus pandemic, had to regretfully cancel the event. At some point in time, the group plans to get back together to start practicing again, when it is safe to do so. The members usually hold both a spring concert and a Christmas concert each year, but we will have to see if that will be possible this year.

Another singing group at Kolping is a new group formed by Kolping member Paul Ahrnsen, with the "song leaders" being Sepp Abt and Pat Whalen. The members get together twice a month, singing many of the old German beer-drinking songs and having a great time. They are officially called the Ratskeller Liederkranz, but by the end of the evening, they call themselves the "Beer Choir". This group suspended activity at the beginning of the pandemic, but are now back together singing on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month in the Kolping Pavilion, with proper social-distancing, of course.

So you can see, the German music tradition is alive and well at Cincinnati Kolping!


